## THE REASONS

Overgrown vegetation poses a threat to public health by decreasing visibility and safety. Green spaces can improve the aesthetics of our community while providing a variety of environmental, economic, and health benefits. As a homeowner it is important to keep your streets, sidewalks, and other public areas open and accessible from overgrown vegetation. Regulations under the **Chapter 9-17**: Vegetative Sidewalk and Roadway Encroachments:

#### **Sidewalks**

Maintain a clear path by trimming tree limbs and vegetation to the sidewalk edge and at least **8 feet** above sidewalks.

### Streets/ Alleyways

Maintain a clear path by trimming tree limbs and vegetation to the street curb and at least 14 feet above streets, bike lanes, and alleys.

### TIPS ON SAFETY

- Increases pedestrian and vehicle safety.
- Allows better access for first responders and snow removal.
- Keeps trees healthy while providing shade and improving air quality in Rochester

# THE RULES

# **Property Owner Responsibility**

Property owners are responsible for caring and maintaining vegetation on private property. Overgrown trees, plants, or grass can block traffic signs, signals, fire hydrants, vehicles, and people. Prune trees and trim vegetation that blocks streets, sidewalks, trails, alleys, and bike lanes. It is important to note that the land between the street and sidewalk (boulevard) is public property. Property owners are responsible for all vegetation maintenance in the boulevard with exception to trees which are managed by/property of the City of Rochester.

## City Responsibility

The City of Rochester owns the public right of way which includes all streets, sidewalks, and alleys. Although trees grown in boulevards are maintained by city-trained crews, keep in mind the property owner is still responsible for maintaining vegetation and mowing grass. Dial **328-2515** to report a tree growing in the right of way.





# KNOW THE RULES

- Sidewalks and recreation trails must be trimmed or cleared of vegetation at least 8 feet above sidewalks and 14 feet above streets, bike lanes, and alleys.
- Obstructing the right of way breaks the City of Rochester Code of Ordinance 9-17.
   The City identifies vegetative encroachment as a barrier for individuals with disabilities and a violation of the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- Do not prune or remove trees in the right of way.
   Dial 328-2515 to report a tree in violation.



## **NEW PERSPECTIVES**

- People will often walk into the street if the pathway is blocked, putting them in a less safe environment.
- Overgrown trees, plants, or grass can block traffic signs, signals, fire hydrants, vehicles, and people.


