

In compliance with state reporting requirements, RPD shares crime counts with the Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension (BCA). Local data is included in the Minnesota Crime Data Explorer. Data in this report and the Minnesota Crime Data Explorer will differ slightly for various reasons, including delayed reporting of crimes by victims.

PATROL



Patrol provides 24/7 services throughout the City of Rochester. Patrol officers respond to incidents ranging from medicals to shootings to crashes.

In 2023, officers responded to 62,162 incidents or calls for service, an 8% increase from the previous year.

PERSON IN CRISIS CALLS

Person in crisis calls, which often involve individuals experiencing a mental health emergency, continued to rise. Officers responded to 1,998 person in crisis calls, an 18% increase from the previous year and a 64% increase over the last five years.

Officers often pair up with community outreach specialists (embedded social workers) to respond to these calls.

DRUG OVERDOSES

Officers responded to ten overdose deaths and a total of 89 drug overdoses, which is a 26% decrease from the previous year.

We know this is not an accurate representation of overdoses in our community. It does not account for overdoses where bystanders administer naloxone/NARCAN, a now widely available medication used to reverse an opioid overdose. Officers administered NARCAN 42 times in 2023.

When an overdose occurs, officers and community outreach specialists attempt to

reconnect with those who have overdosed to inform them about the Police Assisted Recovery (PAR) program.

PAR guides people toward resources and tools needed to begin a path toward sobriety. In 2023, 35 people sought residential treatment through PAR.

TRAFFIC SAFETY

Although traffic stops increased in 2024, traffic safety continued to be growing community concern. RPD tried to target areas of concern, some of which were identified by community members. (A <u>form</u> on our website makes it easy for anyone to share a traffic concern).

SPECIAL ENFORCEMENT TEAMS

Patrol formed Special Enforcement Teams (SET) to proactively address areas of concern identified through RPD's Violence Interruption Priorities (VIP) group. SET investigated 15 weapons violations calls, many of which were self-initiated.

The SET pilot project displayed proof of concept through its effort to target specific problems and make an almost immediate impact by removing dangerous persons, weapons and drugs from the streets.

INVESTIGATIONS



Investigations conducts thorough investigations on crimes committed in the City of Rochester. Investigators work closely with victims and prosecutors to bring criminals to justice.

The Investigations division was assigned 1,981 cases to investigate in 2023. The case load reflects operational efficiencies achieved by case assignment improvements.

Investigations continued to see a high number of domestic assault cases -- 244 in 2023.

In a case that resulted in national media attention, Connor Bowman, a medical resident, was indicted on first degree murder. RPD investigators served multiple warrants and gathered the necessary evidence to prove that Bowman poisoned his wife.

INTERNET CRIMES AGAINST CHILDREN (ICAC)

The **Technology Forensic Unit** (TFU) receives tips from the the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children and the Minnesota ICAC task force.

The TFU conducted 27 local ICAC investigations and served 49 ICAC-related search warrants, resulting in 14 successfully prosecuted arrests/referrals.



Drug Seizures

Fentanyl and methamphetamine continued to be the most encountered controlled substances by the **Criminal Interdiction Unit** (CIU). The drug seizure totals below are from cases that CIU led, assisted on and/or initiated.

9.57 pounds of fentanyl

equaling approximately

43,000 fentanyl pills

18.2 pounds of methamphetamine

436 grams of cocaine

17.2 pounds of ketamine

101 grams of crack

The Intelligence Unit corresponded with more than **200** law enforcement agencies across the United States and Canada regarding homicides, human trafficking, nationwide retail theft, fugitives, missing persons, transnational drug trafficking, international money laundering and more. Other Intelligence Unit highlights:

- Tracked RPD recovery of 76 firearms.
- Processed more than 500 calls on the Narcotics Tipline and <u>Crime Stoppers webpage</u>.

SERVICES



Services makes sure the department has the tools necessary to function optimally. Dispatch, Records/Evidence, Fleet Maintenance and Training are included within Services.

Dispatch and Records/Evidence serve both RPD and Olmsted County Sheriff's Office.

PHONE CALLS INTO DISPATCH

- Fulfilled 6,860 data requests.
- Processed approximately 110 requests for body worn camera video, requiring 315 hours of redaction time.
- Conducted 280 local backgound checks by request for various reasons.
- Significant data cleanup in preparation for data migration to a new records management system coming in 2024.

Evidence

- Initiated an audit of property and evidence room records and inventories. An
 independent firm conducted a comprehensive survey of the facilities and procedures
 and made some minor recommendations.
- Took in approximately 8,470 pieces of evidence.
- Took out (destroyed, returned, auctioned, etc.) approximately 11,140 pieces of evidence.



Fleet Maintenance

RPD replaced eight of its 44 Patrol vehicles in 2023. A typical squad put on an average of 32,900 miles during the year.

Fun Fact: Patrol vehicles went through 272 oil filters in 2023.

TRAINING

Officers receive ongoing training beyond what is required by the Minnesota Peace Officer Standard and Training (POST) board. Some of the trainings in 2023 included crisis intervention, active shooter and courtroom basics.



In response to increasing calls involving people experiencing mental health emergencies, officers attended a 40-hour crisis intervention training in March. The training included interactive role-play scenarios with actors.





RPD led and participated in an active shooter drill in August. Partners from the Rochester Fire Department, BCA and FBI also participated in the drill.

Officers attended a courtroom training on the structured process of a court/jury trial and basic evidence principles. They participated in mock trials in the roles of officers, witnesses and jurors. Area attorneys and law clerks had the opportunity to present or defend a "mock" case.

TRAINING







RPD welcomed two recruit classes in 2023. A total of 11 officers completed RPD's robust, in-house police academy. The Training Unit facilitates a 12-week academy for new officers and a condensed version for lateral hires.

Five of the 11 officers were lateral hires, and combined they share 60 years of law enforcement experience.





COMMUNITY SERVICES



Community Services fosters relationships in the community so that together we can collaboratively solve problems and reduce crime.



The Community Action Team (CAT) is dedicated to fostering relationships to build trust and proactively address community concerns. In 2023, CAT participated in more than 150 community engagement events.

Officers from throughout the department participated in larger events such as Shop with a Cop, Night to Unite and Safe City Nights. Safe City Nights is a community-wide series of events that CAT coordinates. An estimated 4,225 people attended Safe City Nights in 2023.

Cops & Kids Community Bike Program

RPD received a \$25,000 grant to expand the Cops & Kids Community Bike Program.

In partnership with the Minnesota Office of Traffic Safety (OTS), RPD was one of three agencies awarded funding from the Governors Highway Safety Association and the National Road Safety Foundation to help youth stay safe while walking, biking and scooting.







RPD received 6,775 calls for service in the downtown district in 2023. Two Downtown Resource Officers are dedicated to serving the area and working toward long-term solutions on issues impacting the downtown community.



Six School Resource Officers (SROs) responded to 513 calls for service at Rochester Public Schools. The top call types were:

- 1. Assist
- 2. Disorderly Conduct
- 3. Community Service



Five Hospital Resource Officers (HROs) responded to 2,254 calls for service at Mayo Clinic Hospital, St. Marys Campus. The top call types were:

- 1. Disorderly Conduct
- 2. Simple Assault
- 3. Property Damage
